Who we heard from

- 101 total respondents (from ~380 VPC email recipients = 26%)
- Good representation of 50+ group (90% of total respondents)
- Majority are married
- 18% of respondents have children/youth who regularly attend something at VPC
 - Majority are school age or older
- Two thirds have attended VPC for 10 years or longer
- Engaged, thoughtful comments throughout

What we learned - highlights

- Congregation is paying attention Almost all are at least reasonably familiar with local restrictions & guidance on COVID-19
 - Recognized as dynamic "Things are changing so fast, I need to hear daily what the rules are"
- Most are looking for significant safety assurance before returning to worship
 - For almost half, this would have to be a vaccine, new treatment or major decline in infection rates.
- A smaller group is ready to show up at the first opportunity, but they still want to know VPC is taking all needed precautions before they do


What we learned - highlights

- "Cautious" is a key watchword. Several have health conditions making this time particularly threatening
- There is great appreciation for all VPC has done thus far "I think VPC is doing a great job during very difficult circumstances."
- Majority say they're confident they could easily honor all types of precautions in order to return to church (70%)
 - Exception might be distancing seen as a bit more challenging
 - Parents say their kids could comply as well
 - In several comments, people admit good intentions may not always translate into good behavior
 - Question arose: Who would do enforcement?

What we learned - highlights

- Zoom and the online worship services are seen as very effective interim measures for now. Not perfect, but effective.
 - "I love the Zoom gatherings because I feel safe."
- No great urgency to have non-worship meetings at church
- There's strong yearning to reconnect physically and experience music and worship in the sanctuary, BUT there's a prevailing belief that this will take time
 - "Unless we learn something new that is proven and failsafe, I'm going to wait. I think it may be awhile.."
- There is interest in worshipping outside, perhaps in the redwoods, as a temporary option. Many other creative ideas appear in comments




Q1: How familiar are you with the restrictions and guidance from our local governments concerning church worship gatherings?




Q1. COMMENTS about familiarity with local restrictions and guidance

WILL WAIT

- Will wait for more specific info. I know some one I talk with at St Anthony's goes every other week to her Catholic Church in San Mateo County. Only certain part of the alphabet goes on specific days. I could see starting out in the redwoods first.
- I have several co-morbidities so must be very cautious
- I have Type 1 Diabetes
- I am a vulnerable age in decent health but my husband is very vulnerable so I am being very conservative
- im so needing that place of community and seeking but i will be cautious about returning as i am 80.
- I absolutely want to be there and I know it isnt possible to be with one another till we can guarantee everyone's safety and health.
- I am in the most susceptible group at my age and probably won't be able to come to church for quite a while. I wish that I could, as I miss it a lot.

WILL WAIT (continued)

- I am sheltering in place and for now, will continue to shelter in place because that feels safe for me.
- I would love to be there, but as a member of the choir, it's hard to know the best path. Choirs seem to be particularly vulnerable, because we're expressing air, and then breathing deeply, neither of those is good for COVID
- In my opinion we should wait.
- My decision on returning to in-person services will be affected by policies adopted by the Sequoias, which has an obvious interest in being especially careful because of all the very vulnerable residents of our community.
- I will return after getting vaccinated.
- Unless we learn something new that is proven and failsafe, I'm going to wait. I think it may be awhile.

UNCERTAIN, MIGHT RETURN SOONER IF. . .

- With appropriate social distancing and good ventilation I would consider returning before we have a vaccine as long as it was permitted by the authorities.
- But I will wait to see how things unfold. Perhaps I would return without major developments, but I'd be quite cautious.
- I am not yet sure what I want to do and will watch the current developments
- need well-defined rules for everyone before we are OK to gather
- Hard to wrap our heads around everything now. Child care is a major factor since we are involved in the service on the music front.

NO RUSH. WE'RE DOING OK.

- The Zoom service is remarkably effective. Don't get to easily visit with people but do get to worship
- Continuing to worship by Zoom allows our more vulnerable members to fully participate, including virtual coffee hour
- Meeting for church via Zoom is a safer alternative until this virus is under control





Q3: What needs to be in place before worshipping at VPC? - BY AGE GROUPING




Q3. COMMENTS about what needs to be in place before returning to worship

- I have asthma and am more cautious than most.
- All of the above.
- "Local communities" need to be defined as membership spans Pacifica to San Jose! Even if we were able to sit socially distanced (and whom would we exclude to keep attendance down?) and wearing masks, entering/exiting the church would remain a risk, not to mention the strong need to exchange hugs and socialize.
- I believe that VPC is taking the correct precautions.

DISTANCING

- Likely can do the physical distancing but is tough
- IT will be very hard to keep six feet distance in church and space throughout the sanctuary, even if my family members are on one pew. That means that you cannot have anyone else in pews around me for 6 feet. Who is going to monitor that and how would be every set that up
- I would carefully follow all the rules and suggestions, but acknowledge that it
 would be difficult for everyone to follow them strictly, given narrow spaces,
 temptation to reach out, widespread desire to connect with friends we have not
 been close to in a long time, etc.
- I think all of us have a tendency to drift closer than we intend. I'm just being honest. I would INTEND to stay at least six feet away from others, but if I engaged in conversation, I might well end up closer despite my best efforts.
- I am perfectly willing to do all of these things, but think it might be difficult to keep enough distance from others if there are a lot of people on the grounds/in church.
- No hugging is hard but I won't let it be the reason I am not coming back to worship in person
- I've found it's hard to maintain distance when in a larger group. We all forget in our desire to connect

NO HANDOUTS, BIBLES OR HYMNALS

- The only item I almost checked was programs and hymnals. But perhaps that can be supplanted with monitors
- I would bring my own bible of some instructed. Perhaps we could be provided hymns by electronic links to our cell phones to allow us to sing worship songs

 the risks.

- I could do these but not sure my children could


PREFER OUTSIDE OR OTHER OPTIONS



- Crowded aisles could be handled with the protocols.


Q5: Do you have children who normally attend worship or other youth activities at VPC (pre-Pandemic)?






Q8. COMMENTS about attending non-worship, non-choir gatherings

- Provided that the number of cases were under control.
- I do not plan to come to other activities at this point until it is clear that risks have significantly declined. I prefer to have on online activities and do not think our church can sustain a robust "on site" and Zoom platform at the same time. We do not have those types of resources in place. Group "pressure" to get back to normal - even if everyone is trying hard to observe all the results strictly - would raise challenging issues, since everyone's risk level (and behavior management capacity) is different.
- That said, I'd be most comfortable over Zoom. I would try an outdoor meeting, and see if it made me too nervous.

- I just miss being in the sanctuary




OTHER

- I miss the people and the spiritual grounding but zoom has been great for that. I have probably gotten to know people better through zooms and done more spiritual work that I was able to do before.


Q11: Your age




Q12: Marital Status

RESUME WORSHIP SERVICES AT CHURCH

- Do your best to get face to face worship for your congregation.
- The worship team has done really impressive and creative work with online services, but it's not the same as in-person worship. The kids, in particular, are much less engaged; I have serious concerns about keeping kids, especially the older kids, engaged in worship and the church community if we do not return very soon to in-person worship and Sunday school in some form. Separately, the men's groups been meeting online, and I've been involved in that, and that seems to be working pretty well.

ZOOM & ONLINE OPTIONS

- You are doing a great job holding the church together! Lots of good online opportunities. I think keeping worship online as long as possible will help the high-risk population, who will hesitate to return until the virus is under control. I am very worried about burning Jenny out. It must be so much work to prepare the online Sunday services. The needs of the congregation are deep and wide during the pandemic. I hope we can care for her as she cares for us.
- Connect by whatever means possible keeping safety standards and when necessary use Zoom

CREATIVE IDEAS FOR WORSHIP IN THE MEANTIME

- This is a heavy load for all of us. We should not be excessively frightened or excessively lax about proceeding to get together. Maybe we could conduct services in the grove and parking area setup with chairs ... or even circles on the ground for family groups spread all over for limber folks chairs in the Labyrinth for older folks . . . and service from the center. we would need a very good speaker set up Another idea could be...Services with 30 folks with is 1/4 of the congregation But people would have to pick/book only 1 Sunday to attend each month
- There are a lot of creative ways to make in person service work. You can make the aisles be in one direction in the main sanctuary, for example, the two outer can be for going towards the pulpit and the middle away. You can block off pews or seats in pews with rope...alternate what side the seats are open or put cardboard boxes where you don't want people to be. You can have a singer, sing on the patio. If doing outside service, you could close off the small parking lot and hold services there with spaced chairs. Have two services...people sign up for which one they want to attend ahead of time if you think that there

will be too many people. There are lots of options

- More drive through communion, choir singing outside, music
- More music in the digital services!

OUTREACH / CONNECT / CARE FOR OTHERS

- We should just postpone Footprints for a year. Seems to be little interest in gathering or zoom for now. Would be nice to coordinate a mission project or something we can all do at home and pool at church to help those hurting so much.
